This group has been meeting since 1999 when a group of ladies met to make a millennium


banner for the Church. We have been meeting every week since!

Sanctuary Cinema

During the first 3 months of this year we opened up the Church building as part of the Fife Voluntary Action (FVA) initiative to provide warm spaces to the local community. We received grant assistance from FVA and decided to trial Community Cinema as part of the initiative; hence the Sanctuary Cinema was born.

Our warm space was available on Wednesday afternoons from 1:30 to 5:00 pm. Film screenings alternated with game event afternoons for a total of 12 openings, 6 for films and 6 for games events. All the events were thoroughly enjoyed by those attending with the film days getting around double the numbers attending the game events.



The Sanctuary Cinema was a great hit. The films ranged from the 'Book Thief' to 'Downton Abbey' to 'Ticket to Paradise' - George Clooney certainly draws them in but, the biggest audience we had

was for 'Mrs Harris goes to Paris'. The Cinema can comfortably seat 50 people and with the church's new sound system the overall experience received a fantastic response from all those who enjoyed the films, the refreshments and the 'halftime' chat.

Thanks are due to the volunteers from both the Church and the Community Council who helped provide teas, coffees, biscuits

etc. and gave their time taking part in the games events. Chris Smith is now а professional Tri-ominos (Triangle dominoes) player!



Although the FVA Warm Spaces initiative was for the winter months only we hope to operate the Sanctuary Cinema events on a year-round basis,

Compassion is an international Christian child development and child advocacy ministry which began in 1952. It is Christ centred, child focussed and church based,



focusing on the holistic development of each child coupled with the development of a 1-1 relationship between that child and their sponsor. Individual sponsors (or groups like us) in the UK contribute £28 a month to support each child in a Compassion programme. А monetary contribution is also made for birthday, Christmas, family and project gifts.
